HERITAGE TRAIL

Did you know that we now have a Heritage Trail? Open since July 3rd, the trail presents an overview of the history of the first settlers and prominent people as well as some heritage buildings in the Township.

This project originated from the municipal strategic development planning sessions. Citizens expressed a desire to showcase our natural and built heritage and to develop tourism. We received a subsidy of \$6 880 from the RCM of Memphremagog.

Not only are the trail panels filled with useful information but the main ones offer a map of the Township, which is a useful tool for tourists and visitors. The renovation of the postal shelter and creation of the gardens in the Georgeville parking area came from the need to find a home for the Heritage Trail signs.

There are 5 stops on the 23 km long trail. It is open all year round. Take the time to follow the trail, enjoy the panorama and even stop for a picnic along the way. We suggest you start either in the Georgeville parking lot or at the Town Hall in Fitch Bay. It is in these two places that you will find the large introductory panel with the full map of the trail. Paper brochures are also available there. Invite your friends and families to discover our beautiful home in the Eastern

New agreement with Magog ecocentre

An agreement was reached with the City of Magog last September and it is now possible to bring your recyclable and recoverable materials to the ecocentre. You can dispose of clothing, green residues, such as leaves, renovation and construction materials, metals, mattresses, computer equipment, tires with or without rims, wood, styrofoam, oversized cardboards and all recyclable products. It is also possible to take household hazardous waste such as paint, aerosol spray, acid and pesticides. Regarding building materials and non-recyclable materials, the first three cubic meters are free and a \$ 30 fee will be applied on additional cubic meters.

To access the center, the cost is \$5.85 for 2016, and as of next year the amount will be \$20.00 regardless of which month you register. Inscription is renewable each year and must be done at the Town Hall, 778, Sheldon road.



Afterwards, your inscription will be sent to the ecocentre, and you will then have access.

Looking for paratransit or public transportation?

The municipality wishes to apply for those services in our municipality. We cannot do that without a minimum of people who have shown an interest. November 30th, 2016 is the deadline for applying for this service in 2017.

You are probably eligible for paratransit if you:

- are a disabled person (liable to encounter barriers in performing everyday activities).
- have mobility limitations justifying the use of a paratransit service.

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THE VILLAGE SCHOOL, THEN AND NOW

1954: The school board of Fitch Bay passes a resolution to build a new school in the village.

- 1956: A permit request was sent to the *Département de l'instruction Publique* for the construction of a school including 3 classes and 1 apartment, purchase of the land from Mr. Wallace Camber for \$ 1 100, request for tenders, tender granted to Mr. Rosaire Fournier, beginning of the work, cost of the construction: \$ 42,000, total cost: \$50 600 including the furniture, landscaping, supervision and unforeseen work. September 1956: I personally started grade 1 in a school that was formerly a church before the new school was ready.
- 1957: Opening of the school with 3 classes and 3 grades per class.
- 1958 : Arrival of the sisters from the *Filles de la Charité du Sacré-Coeur* as teachers and the school was named *Notre-Dame du Sacré-Cœur*.
- 1959 : The school board built an additional class and an apartment for the sisters.
- 1972: The Fitch Bay School Board ceased to exist and was regrouped with the Magog School Board. Only elementary students attended the school.
- 1992 : The name was changed to La Fourmilière de Fitch Bay
- 1993: 84 students attended the school in grades kindergarten to 6th grade.
- 2000: Closing of the school
- 2003 : The Municipality purchases the school for \$ 27 000, payable in 5 annual payments of \$ 5400. The last payment was in May of 2007. Opening of the *La Fourmilière* Community Center.
- 2010 : Due to recurring water infiltration problems with the roof, the Council requested complete inspections of the building. Observation: the structural capacities of the building are found insufficient and non-compliant. The very high costs to address this problem, in addition to any unforeseen problem that could be found, the Council did not deem investing in the building a smart move and opted for its demolition. The building was used, however, until December 2013.
- 2016: It was demolished in last September for \$ 43 860 + taxes. Council is studying the possibility of using the land site for the construction of a new building.


Program for upgrading septic systems

For eligible properties, the municipality will grant a refundable advance of funds (loan) to the property owner who replaces his septic system.

<u>Eligibility criteria:</u> the septic system was installed before 1981 or is not in compliance with current provincial regulations Q2 r22.

Here are the benefits of participating in this program:

- Reduced risks associated with an aging septic system (contamination of land, of wells, back up in the house, etc.);
- Offers the possibility of paying for the work over a period of 20 years;
- Repayment of the loan is done each year on the tax bill with affordable interest rates;



<u>Please note that if any malfunction of your septic system is discovered the immediate replacement of the system will be required.</u>

To prevent this, be proactive and replace your system now.

Healthy Fitch Bay Project An initiative amongst others

As part of the Healthy Fitch Bay project, the municipality, in collaboration with Memphremagog Conservation Inc. (MCI), has tried a method of controlling a patch of phragmites (European common reed) near Forand Park. A dozen volunteers worked to cut and remove the stems of phragmites which were then sent to the landfill. Volunteers then laid down a fabric to prevent the plant from growing back. Monitoring will be conducted to control this plant as it tends to invade wetlands and ditches. As the presence of the plant is located in a several locations, we hope that by quickly intervening, we can avoid it spreading around the bay.

MCI organized a canoe and kayak outing in August where thirty people attended. Two biologists

showed us the richness and variety of fauna and flora in and around the bay. Definitely an activity to redo in the future.

Both local residents and boaters observed a lengthy episode of cyanobacteria this summer mainly in the portheastern portion of

cyanobacteria this summer, mainly in the northeastern portion of the bay. Elsewhere on the lake, very few episodes of blue-green algae were reported. A sign that the water quality of the bay needs to be monitored. It is important that everyone takes actions to protect it. As water front residents and users, you received,

with the last bulletin, a guide describing actions that you can take to ensure that this trend is reversed and help improve the water quality. Other communities have done it...the Municipality will continue to intervene so that the regulations for riparian strips are respected. Farmers will also be met concerning the *Prime-vert* program, a program initiated by MCI. It is a program to help encourage them to find ways to minimize the input of sediments in watercourses, as well as avoiding agricultural losses, thanks to a grant from the *Ministère de l'agriculture, pêcheries et de l'alimentation du Québec* (MAPAQ).



PREVENTION VISITS

Prevention visits done by our firefighters have already started. Visits will be from Monday through Friday from 6 to 8 pm., Saturday and Sunday from 10 am to 4 pm. and usually only last 15 minutes. Firefighters will verify smoke detectors, carbon monoxide detectors and will emphasize the visibility of civic numbers. They are easily identifiable as they will be dressed in their uniforms or t-shirts with the Municipality's logo. Approximately 220 properties will be inspected each year for a duration of five years. Restauration of the St-Georges Anglican church in Georgeville for the 150th anniversary.



A positive response from the *Conseil du patrimoine* religieux du Québec, whose funding comes from the Ministry of Culture and Communication, gave the kickoff to the fundraising campaign. A grant of 70% was awarded, so 30% had to come from the community.

The work carried out was: a new chimney, painting of the exterior, changes to the structure, repairing of the roof, deep cleaning of the ceiling and floors and the addition of a



washroom. Originally, the amount of the grant was to be \$ 150,000 for work estimated at \$ 214,000. However, unexpected expenses raised the bill to over \$ 276,000. The Conseil du patrimoine religieux therefore increased the amount of the grant by \$ 30 000. The private sector made the project achievable by supplying the amount of \$ 89,000.

Bravo to the church committee and in particular, Mr. John Hoblyn and Mr. Daine (Toby) Rochester!
